NSF Grant Will Help UO, OSU and UW Expand Mass Timber Use

Around the O, May 22, 2023

Researchers from the University of Oregon and two other schools will use a \$1 million grant from the National Science Foundation to advance mass timber technologies in Oregon and Washington. The other institutions are Oregon State University and the University of Washington.

Researchers will look for ways to expand the use of mass timber, generating more business for the timber industry and aiding rural communities.

It is a sustainable alternative to concrete and steel, and its use in buildings can reduce the carbon footprint of the U.S. building industry.

At the same time, mass timber buildings can help to improve forest health and reduce catastrophic wildfires by using wood fiber from forest restoration projects.



On a recent trip with the Hanschus down the Oregon Coast to Crescent City, California, Anne loaned me this book. I managed to read it while we moseyed down Hwy 101 for four enjoyable days along the coast.

The book emphasized how much more there is to know about coastal redwoods, *Sequoia sempervirens*, than that it is the tallest but not the biggest redwood, and this is the only place in the world it grows.

Richard Preston identifies his book as narrative non-fiction. His writing draws you into the story of young, daring people who discover so much more than the challenge of climbing these trees. They end up adding much more scientific knowledge of the ecology of this impressive tree.

I highly recommend this book and give thanks to Rick Zenn for steering us onto it.



Forestry for the Birds Workshop, May 20, at Anne and Richard Hanschu's woodland.

Merlin app from Bonnie's 5-minute woods walk



It was a beautiful day for whatever you were doing, and twenty-five woodland owners showed up for an informative day talking about Forestry for the Birds. Maura, Riley, and Nicole from the Forest Stewards Guild gave us some history of the program and ideas for our forest management keeping birds in mind. They gave participants a newly published book "Forestry for the Birds, Western Oregon," the first such book on the west coast.

The first "Forestry for the Birds" book originated in Vermont by the Vermont Audubon Society. They had noticed that birds in the local flyway were reduced and that most of the forests were privately owned. Their book could help make these forests more bird friendly. Maine, Rhode Island, New Jersey and others followed suit for their areas and now Western Oregon has joined with the same goal "To keep common birds common and forests forested."

For the Western Oregon book, twelve focal bird species were selected. They are all common birds with specific habitats and are easy to identify. Necessary bird-friendly components are: Canopy, Health, Resources and Protection (CHRP) A variety in each component is advised. We were told to remember that "birds love a messy forest."

We observed a riparian area, a new planting, a densely forested area, and a mature forest - all with unique habitats for birds.

We were also introduced to an app from Cornell Labs called "Merlin" which identifies birds through sounds or visuals. It's free and fun.



OFRI has developed a series of fact sheets summarizing the Private Forest Accord (PFA) targeted at small forestland owners. Fact sheets cover what the PFA is, how it affects forestland owners, and specific proposed changes to the Oregon forest practice rules.

The seedling supply for the 2024 planting season looks to be in good order with Lewis River Reforestation reporting 50,000 to 55,000 Douglas-fir seedlings transferred to the planting beds.

With a normal survival rate in the high 90 percentile, we should have a good supply of seedlings for WCSWA members and a few available for non-members.

These will be from the Dallas seed zone.

5,000 Western Red Cedar Hi-Terpene have also been ordered. Bob Shumaker and I talked about going back to the straight-run cedar, but decided there is only a few cents difference between the two cedars.

This is just a friendly reminder to sharpen your tree planting shovels and hodads as planting season is only 6 months away.

WCSWA May Potluck and Speaker Recap

Tuesday, May 23 was our annual Potluck, held this year at Jackson Bottom Wetlands. The weather was so fine that it was hard not to go for a walk in the beautiful Wetlands, but the camaraderie and good food put that off until another day. After the meal, Julie Woodward introduced us to OFRl's new hire, Kathryn Charlton. Julie has recently been promoted to Director of Forestry after the retirement of Mike Cloughesy, and Kathryn will fill Julie's former position of Forest Landowner Education Manager. Julie told us of OFRI's three-fold mission of public education, K-12 education, and landowner education. OFRI has eight staff members, and a 13-member Board of Directors. It is funded by a portion of the harvest tax with an average annual budget of four million dollars. This budget funds TV fall and spring commercials for public education, K-12 education for teachers and students, and landowner education. Forty-five of ORFI's programs are certified by the state which brings in federal funding, too. OFRI supplies funds for buses for field trips. Their funds also support ONREP (Oregon Natural Resources Education Program) and Talk about Trees, a K-8 in-class learning module. Then there is the Rediscovery Forest at the Oregon Gardens and many great publications available to woodland owners and the public. Check out OFRI's website at www.knowyourforest.org.
